## Hamilton Community Foundation Announces \$1 Million in New Grants Grants support quality of life programming across the city

Hamilton Community Foundation today announced new grants totalling \$1,060,122 to local charities.

More than 100 grants are supporting a wide range of projects across the community, including the arts, health care, housing, education, the environment and recreation. It also includes scholarship and bursaries supporting students in the arts.

The bulk of the grants – some \$345 thousand -- are from the Edith H. Turner Foundation Fund, which focuses in part on meeting the needs of families and family members of all ages. This includes nutrition, stable housing, child and youth enrichment activities, literacy and educational success, job and skills training and support for seniors.

The grants announced today include financial assistance for:

- Reading tutors and food skills programs at Neighbour to Neighbour's mountain programs.
- A leadership development program for youth in three public housing complexes.
- Back to school program for newcomer women that helps them gain their GED
- A program to support employment for at-risk youth with job counselling, experience and wraparound supports such as bus tickets and food cards.
- A program where volunteer engineers work with clients to design and build customized assistive devices when no commercial solution is available

"While there are many encouraging signs that Hamilton is moving forward economically, these are still very challenging times for far too many people in our community," says Matt Goodman, Vice- President, Grants and Community Initiatives. "One way HCF is working to address these challenges is supporting programs that tackle the underlying issues, such as education, that will improve quality of life for everyone in our city."

Last year Hamilton Community Foundation gave grants of \$6.4 million. Since it was founded in 1954, HCF has made close to \$81 million in grants to charities.
