The following is a summary of the 2016-17 grant distributions:

City Housing Hamilton – Learning and Leading through the Arts – leaderships development/art classes with environmental focus for children living in non-profit housing in Dundas	\$9,300
Dundas Valley School of Art – Aging Artfully Outreach Program – provides art programming at three locations for seniors in Dundas. Programming will assist cognitive function, small motor skills and will break down isolation.	\$10,000
Dundas Youth Chaplaincy – Supporting grant for core work of Routes to provide workshops, homework help and training sessions for youth at risk in the Dundas community.	\$15,000
Carnegie Gallery – Carnegie Coffee House Nights for LGBTQ Youth – request is to support monthly coffee house nights for LGBTQ Youth.	\$4,350
Urquhart Butterfly Garden SPONSOR: Conserver Society of Hamilton District Urquhart Butterfly Garden Summer Educational Programme 2017 – the program provides weekly educational workshops emphasizing local conservation and environmental issues	\$2,800
The Salvation Army – Ellen Osler Home Reintegration Project – request is to support the re-integration of residents of the Ellen Osler Home into the community. The home is a residential program for women who are currently serving federal sentences. The request includes having EO staff attend parole board hearings for prospective residents as well as aftercare costs faced by the women such as transportation.	\$5,622
Salvation Army – Ellen Osler Home: Exterior Painting – the Ellen Osler Home is located in a historic home in Dundas. Completion of property improvement by exterior painting	\$15,000
Dundas Valley Orchestra – Support the November 2017 concert during Arts Dundas Weekend as well as outreach performances at local nursing homes and long-term care facilities.	\$5,700
St. Joseph's Villa Foundation – Enhanced Care Program – request is to cover the costs of priority items that improve the quality of life for residents of St. Joseph's Villa, including bariatric beds and nurse call alarms.	\$15,000
Royal Botanical Gardens EcoPark System – Berry Tract South Naturalization The purpose of the grant is to renaturalize a newly acquired property (which was formerly farm field) to native meadow. The property is part of the Cootes to Escarpment EcoPark System. Native meadows are a rare habitat in Southern Ontario, which provide essential habitat to many increasingly rare species.	\$11,200
