LOCAL ACTION FOR PEACE

Ray Cunnington's passion is peace. And he believes that individuals, not just nations, create the conditions for peace both locally and around the world. He's a perfect example of putting that idea into practice.

Ray has a long history of peace initiatives. At age 96, he recently published a book on peace called Towards Less Adversarial Cultures. The previous year, he was awarded the Hamilton/Burlington/ Brantford YMCA Peace Medal. Three years ago, he established a fund at Hamilton Community Foundation to provide support for Culture of Peace Hamilton, a United Nations-backed group that works with others in the community to promote non-violence locally. The group holds monthly

meetings, sponsors a public peace lunch and discussion twice a year, and has made significant donations to the city's Peace Garden. It continues to uphold the UN doctrine that peace involves individual commitment.

> In 2000, the UN proposed six practical suggestions for people who wanted to promote peace — clear, straightforward acts like rejecting violence and preserving the planet. More than 75 million people around the world pledged to follow them in their daily lives.

- Rediscover solidarity

But times change. The world has gradually shifted away from personal responsibility back to governments and nations. Concerned that these very good suggestions might get lost or forgotten, Ray looked for a way they could be preserved and protected.

He found a home for Culture of Peace at HCF. He saw Terry Cooke on television, and "Terry made it seem so simple to set up a fund for a good purpose," Ray says. "The Foundation is a respected organization of thinking people who want to do something good for the world." Ray is certainly one of them.

TUTORING PROGRAM HELPS STUDENTS MAKE THE GRADE IN THEIR NEW HOME

Using everything from fraction games and makeyour-own-book projects to soccer tournaments and campus tours, Empowerment Squared's *Homework Circle* is helping newcomer youth imagine a brighter future through education.

The program is supported by ABACUS, HCF's 10-year initiative to increase high-school graduation and post-secondary access in Hamilton. Through ABACUS, the *Homework Circle* will provide one-on-one tutoring, mentoring and academic goal setting to remove educational barriers for as many as 100 at-risk and newcomer middle-school students each year.

Executive director Leo Johnson says that 75 percent of the youth have first languages other than English. Ninety percent have been placed in a grade much higher than their academic ability. "Without support, they won't have enough credits to graduate high school," he says.

ABACUS support expanded the *Homework Circle* to middle-school youth, but it builds on seven years of success. Past participants now include a lawyer, psychiatric nurse and chiropractor. Twelve-year-old Nawel wants to be a doctor. "I'm in Grade 6 now but sometimes they give me Grade 7 work," she says. "This program changed my life. They never give up on you."

Participants can often see themselves in the mentors, many of whom come from McMaster's African Students Association, Muslim Students' Association, Nu Omega Zeta (Canada's first Blackfocused sorority), McMaster's Polish Society and Mohawk College's Living Lab Program.

"My family immigrated to Canada," says a Nu Omega Zeta mentor. "I understand the kids' struggles. And I know how important literacy is to university."

The Homework Circle integrates ABACUS findings that show parental engagement directly affects how likely children are to pursue education beyond high school. A six-week digital literacy program

teaches parents key computer and Internet skills, including how to use online translation tools and navigate school board websites, so they can better participate in their children's education. They leave the program with a fully loaded computer.

Additional support from HCF's Edith H. Turner Foundation Fund has allowed the program to handle the overwhelming demand, including from Syrian youth.

"Our biggest success is when kids trust us enough to say they don't know something," says Leo. "Once we get them to a place of self-confidence, they amaze us."

REGIMENT ENSURES ITS LEGACY

The Royal Hamilton Light Infantry's long and rich history in this community now has another tie: a permanent endowment fund at Hamilton Community Foundation.

Known as the "Rileys," the RHLI is a professional, combat-capable army reserve regiment. It is the oldest combat infantry regiment in the Hamilton-Burlington area.

"The regiment's history is Hamilton's history," says
Honorary Colonel Peter Young, noting that the RHLI
began in Hamilton in 1862 — before Confederation.
Through every conflict since then, and many
humanitarian crises, Hamilton families have sent
soldiers overseas and across Canada with the RHLI.

The RHLI Endowment Fund will, in perpetuity, "look after the regimental family," says Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel Don Cranston. "And that family includes not only soldiers and their families, but also our two cadet corps, ceremonial guard, our band, our museum, our veterans association and our historical artifacts."

As an agency fund, the RHLI endowment will support its wide-ranging programs such as bursaries for returning soldiers to pursue post-secondary education, loans and help with job transitions, a variety of family support services, maintaining the regiment's archives, and other crucial services. Over time, the RHLI hopes to build the fund with legacy

gifts and other contributions from families who share a history with the regiment.

The RHLI chose Hamilton Community Foundation to house its fund because of the "depth and breadth of the Foundation," says Don. "Its great governance, its professionalism and track record, its brand recognition in Hamilton — all this is a huge assistance to the RHLI."

GIVING WITH CONFIDENCE: LOSANI FAMILY FOUNDATION FUND

Shelly Losani didn't expect that being engaged in responding to community needs would feel so natural — and so important.

After years of family and corporate giving, she says the feeling she has when she visits an organization and meets the people they are helping is more than satisfaction: "It's a feeling of 'yes of course' — this is how it should be."

Shelly's husband Fred Losani, CEO of Losani Homes, has spearheaded their corporate and family giving over many years and also feels a deep responsibility to the community, both locally and internationally. The couple's three children are involved too, learning new skills from hands-on experience and input into decision-making.

The company has encouraged the philanthropy of its corporate partners, with tireless help from employees. The family and staff of Losani Homes have worked around the world on housing, clean water, health, and other issues. They support Me to We and local charities like Hamilton Food Share, Good Shepherd, St. Matthew's House and many others.

Hamilton Community Foundation is now home to the Losani Family Foundation Fund, offering the family the knowledge and professionalism of the HCF team.

"Initially, we just found our way," says Shelly. "But we've grown. Now, with HCF, we have someone locally to guide us, make sure we are on track, organized and making an impact. That gives us comfort of mind." She appreciates the Foundation's knowledge and experience, and the role it plays in sorting through funding requests. "We know what we want to do," she says, "and having the Foundation involved means we are giving with a lot more confidence."

"We've been fortunate and we've achieved success in our business," says Fred. "I'm equally proud of the work we are doing through the Losani Family Foundation Fund. Every one of us has a responsibility to make a difference."



Canada's history when it comes to Indigenous people is nothing to be celebrated, but an HCF grant is working to help Hamiltonians heal and move forward together.

In partnership with the Community Fund for Canada's 150th, HCF is supporting 43 wideranging projects across Hamilton that inspire understanding, build healthy communities and engage a broad and diverse group of people.

I Am Committed is a campaign co-led by YÉN:TENE — the Indigenous justice initiative of the Hamilton Community Legal Clinic — and the Professional Aboriginal Advocacy and Networking Group. It will help celebrate Canada's 150 PLUS, the Indigenous-led re-imagining of Canada's sesquicentennial.

I Am Committed asks friends and allies of Indigenous people — some well-known and others not — to have their snapshot published as a symbol of their commitment to the calls to action contained in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's final report.

"We don't want people to just read the report," says Indigenous justice co-ordinator Lyndon George. "We want them to put it into play in their everyday personal and professional lives."

Photos will appear on posters, banners, and the web. Content will be shared in English, French, and Mohawk. Organizers hope newcomers, as well as people whose families have been in Canada for generations, will step forward to make a commitment. "Broken promises and abuse are part of our shared history," Lyndon says. "A move to reconciliation must happen together, nation to nation." YÉN:TENE, in fact, is Mohawk for "You and I will go there together."

You might see Sandi Bell's face on a poster. Her Indigenous heritage was lost when she was adopted. "I didn't grow up with my traditions," she says. "The Black part of me, the Canadian part of me, is definitely an ally." As chair of the legal clinic, she expects the diverse faces of the campaign to inspire people to listen, learn and join in, across Hamilton and beyond.

I Am Committed follows the model used in YÉN:TENE's successful I Am Affected campaign, which used photos of Indigenous people to start conversations about the intergenerational trauma caused by Canada's residential schools.

"This project is all about belonging," Sandi says. "It's about Indigenous people belonging in Hamilton and being free to follow their dreams. And it's about the residents of Hamilton coming together to make sure people belong."

The Community Fund for Canada's 150th is a collaboration between Hamilton Community Foundation, Community Foundations of Canada, the Government of Canada and extraordinary leaders from coast to coast.







HIGH-QUALITY END-OF-LIFE CARE

Linda Hutchinson is ensuring that high standards continue in hospice and palliative care — a legacy that began with her father, Dr. Bob Kemp, a passionate crusader for quality end-of-life care. He played a critical role in bringing palliative care and


the Dr. Bob Kemp Hospice into existence in Stoney Creek/Hamilton.

This year, to further her parents' goals, Linda and her husband Bruce have established the Dr. Bob and Mildred Kemp Palliative Care Education Fund to provide educational awards for health professionals (physicians, nurses and others) to improve their knowledge and skill in the practice of hospice and palliative care. As the need for end-of-life care grows and increases in complexity, specialized education is crucial.

"We have started this fund and as we build it up we are making one award each year," says Linda. "We hope that others will contribute also so that the capacity of the fund to make educational awards will grow in the years ahead." The couple has also involved their children as part of the advisory group to the fund, to encourage them to carry on the vision and generosity of their grandparents.

Linda and Bruce, whose careers have been in education, feel that locating their fund at Hamilton Community Foundation will help attract the broad community support they hope for. They encourage Hamiltonians who care about end-of-life care to contribute to either (or both) of the funds: the Dr. Bob and Mildred Kemp Palliative Care Education Fund for training and education, and the Kemp Hospice itself through the Dr. Bob Kemp Hospice Endowment Fund. Both funds are at HCF.

"I know it was Dad's hope," says Linda, "that people in the community would recognize how important high-quality end-of-life care is and that they would support it."

BISTRO PUTS JOB SKILLS ON THE MENU FOR THOSE LIVING WITH MENTAL ILLNESS

Look behind the stainless steel prep counter at The Rainbow's End Bistro and you'll find a pot of gold — a meaningful job for those with lived experience of mental illness.

The Bistro anchors the busy food court at St. Joseph's Healthcare Hamilton's West 5th location. With a focus on serving healthy, high-quality food, it's a social enterprise providing training and employment for those living with mental illness.

One in five Hamiltonians will experience some form of mental illness in their lifetime. Many want to return to work, but struggle to find opportunities. The Bistro not only provides its team members with training in safe food handling and exposure to a fast-paced kitchen environment, it proves they can be productive contributors to both workplace and community.

"The people who work here show us that despite some very difficult hurdles, they continue to climb," says David Williams, executive director of Rainbow's End. "I learned my relentless enthusiasm from them."

Accommodations come standard. "We adjust the jobs to fit the people," says Tom Varley, who started as kitchen help and is now the Bistro's assistant manager. "Some people come in beaten down, with no self-confidence. Then they see they're a vital member of the team. The change is amazing."

Tom speaks from personal experience. "I was an addict for 25 years. You fool yourself into thinking you're functioning, but you're not. Now I'm fully self-sufficient, and helping others, too. It's like night and day."

With support from an HCF grant, the Bistro is enhancing its training program with six-month paid internships and expanding its catering services.

New signage, equipment and marketing help from Mohawk College students are also on the menu.

"We're successful because of the hard work of our team members," David says. "They belong here. They belong in the community. And they're contributing to the success of Hamilton."

CONNECTING COMMUNITY, ONE MEAL AT A TIME

It's a cold and rainy Saturday morning, but inside Neighbour 2 Neighbour's Hamilton Community Food Centre on Limeridge Road West, everyone gets a warm welcome.

The centre is the first of its kind in Hamilton and only the eighth in Canada — a place that's changing the food system through the power of a great meal, cooked with love and eaten with others.

At the Saturday market and café, a woman from South Korea and her son sample Persian tea and vanilla crêpes. A man from Dubai with a PhD in agriculture fills out a volunteer form. A woman from London, Ontario, in town to visit family, marvels at a table full of bright green chard for her mom's Kurdish dishes. "I don't know of anything like this in my city," she says.

More than one in three people in some Hamilton Mountain neighbourhoods are living below the poverty line, with very few services. Programs at the Hamilton Community Food Centre are free. The market and café sell their wares at or below cost. No one is asked to prove their need.

> "We aren't teaching poor people to cook," clarifies director of community food, Clare Wagner. "We're creating a space for people to grow, cook, share and advocate for good food."

Community Food Centres Canada chose Hamilton from among 24 Ontario communities for a fiveyear, \$1 million investment. A loan from HCF's Hamilton Community Investment Fund is helping to bring the centre to life by supporting construction, a capital campaign and operations.

The centre's programs are filling up before there's even a sign on the building. HCF funds support the Welcome Baby program, delivered in partnership with the City's Public Health Department, and foodfocused after-school and summer programming for children and youth.

Other popular programs are an intercultural community kitchen, lunch and dinner drop-ins, community gardens, a language exchange and community action training.

"There's hope when we bring people from different backgrounds together around food and start talking about what needs to change," says Clare. "This is a space where people can grow and feel valued."

COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP

Leadership on issues that affect Hamiltonians is one way the Foundation works to improve the city's quality of life. Our strategic goal is to increase the health and prosperity of people and neighbourhoods.

ABACUS: Advancing post-secondary access

ABACUS is the Foundation's ten-year initiative to improve high school completion rates and increase access to post-secondary education. It is a focus for both our community leadership and discretionary granting. ABACUS focuses on children in Grades 6, 7 and 8, pivotal years in a child's decision to further their education. The program has three components:

- Grants to community organizations for programming that increases their exposure to, and readiness for, post-secondary education
- A specialized pilot called Grad Track for youth who may face multiple barriers
- Identifying and responding to systems-level barriers and challenges in Hamilton

In its first full year of granting, ABACUS grants funded 17 projects through 16 organizations. In turn, those organizations and programs engaged 4,393 students, 274 parents, and 308 teachers or principals.

Last fall, HCF awarded the second round of grants, bringing ABACUS granting to some \$2.6 million since the program was launched in 2015. Funding supported programming such as extracurricular academic help, mentoring, recreational and arts programs, college and university campus visits, science-technology-engineering-math (STEM)

programs such as coding and robotics clubs, programs that specifically support Aboriginal and newcomer students as well as small grants for teachers to broaden the reach and impact of ABACUS throughout Hamilton.

In addition, Grad Track was launched at Hillcrest Elementary School in Hamilton's public board and St. Patrick's Elementary School in the Catholic board. In these two schools, HCF is funding a "learning coach" to work in and out of school, to provide 40 students with opportunities to explore interests, inspire and further their thinking about post-secondary education.

Neighbourhood Leadership Institute (NLI)

The NLI enhances the skills of neighbourhood and community leaders from across Hamilton. This year, the institute continued to grow, refining its resident stream and launching its professional development stream programming.

In the NLI's resident leadership stream, participants engage in leadership training while developing a project idea for their neighbourhood. Mohawk College has credentialed the program; participants receive a college credit upon successful completion and are then eligible to apply for an HCF grant to help launch their NLI projects. To date, almost 90 neighbourhood leaders have graduated, and many alumni have returned to co-facilitate the program

with Mohawk faculty members and community partners. The City of Toronto is also replicating the resident-stream program, and HCF has been sharing the NLI's learnings with City of Toronto staff.

In October, the NLI launched its professional development stream, partnering with McMaster University's Centre for Continuing Education to develop the Certificate in Leadership in Community Engagement. The Certificate is the first of its kind in Hamilton and is an academically recognized program, supported by McMaster's Faculty of Social Sciences and School of Social Work, as well as by numerous community partners. The Certificate consists of five courses. covering everything from conflict resolution to communication, governance and research methods. Almost 60 professionals from across sectors, organizations and institutions took part in the Certificate's first course last fall, with another full group scheduled for the program this year.

(RE)Imagining NAS

The City of Hamilton's Neighbourhood Action
Strategy (NAS) is focused on helping
neighbourhoods be great places to live, work,
play and learn. As the NAS approached its fifth
anniversary in 2016, the City of Hamilton felt the time
was right to reflect and review its guiding purpose.

Based on the Foundation's long history of supporting neighbourhood community development, the City asked HCF to lead this review. The overarching goal of the project is to

consider the best ways for the NAS to continue to be a relevant and effective resource for neighbourhoods and residents and to ensure they are supported now and in the future.

HCF is working closely with residents on all parts of the project, from developing research, coordinating communication, advising communities, and providing feedback. The goal is to involve all partners equitably in a process that recognizes the unique strengths each one brings to the NAS. As a collective, collaborative effort, the project and Hamilton will be made stronger and more relevant *only* through the variety of voices, perspectives, experiences and ideas, as well as the time, passion and commitment that everyone brings to this work.

This project has two parts. Part 1 aims to develop a conceptual framework for the NAS — that is, discovering and recommending the foundational principles that guide the NAS and its involvement in neighbourhoods. Part 2 will review and revise, where necessary, current NAS structures and operations to match the vision created in Part 1.

Together, the two will guide the processes and actions of the NAS. The project will be completed by the end of 2017.



IMPACT INVESTING: 20 BY 2020

Hamilton Community Foundation's goal is to align all of our assets with our mission in order to multiply the positive change we make. Impact investing is the primary vehicle for achieving this goal; our Board aims to commit 20 percent of our assets to impact investing by 2020.

Impact investing at HCF follows two streams:

- Local: loans to charities, not-for-profits and social enterprises to support or accelerate the delivery of their mission
- National/global: a broader range of investment opportunities that diversify our impact portfolio and encourage the widespread growth of impact investing for community good


LOCAL INVESTMENTS

In the five years since our community loan program was established, the Foundation has met with 36 organizations from across sectors to discuss a variety of project types including bridge financing, program funding, acquiring or renovating property, and operations funding. During fiscal 2016-17 alone, HCF approved \$3.7 million in loans to organizations including:

- Sacajawea Non-Profit Housing Inc., to purchase property for building 16 affordable apartments, a project that addresses a critical local gap for one-person and small-family Aboriginal households
- Neighbour 2 Neighbour, for its new Hamilton Community Food Centre, which serves the Hamilton Mountain as a welcoming community space offering a range of programs with healthy food education at its core
- Indwell, a creator of affordable housing communities, to completely revitalize George and Mary's Tavern on Melvin Avenue into 56 affordable, accessible, energy-efficient apartments
- St. Leonard's Society of Hamilton, a provider of prison-to-community transitional services, to renovate its Emerald Street property into a fully accessible halfway house

The purpose of our loans to date are as follows:






NATIONAL/GLOBAL INVESTMENTS

These direct investments are designed to provide financial return while delivering positive social and/or environmental outcomes. New investments over the last year include:

- Artscape Launchpad, a creative space that is part incubator, part co-working facility and part
 entrepreneurship centre. It provides creative professionals with tools, training, resources, and
 mentorship to build sustainable businesses.
- Greensoil Building Innovation Fund, a growth equity fund investing in companies that provide products,
 services and technologies to make real estate and infrastructure more productive, efficient and sustainable.
- CoPower, which catalyzes clean energy developments across North America by packaging clean energy investment products and by financing initiatives such as geothermal and solar power projects, energyefficient retrofits and LED lighting installations.

The chart below summarizes the growth of our impact portfolio since it was established in 2012. The nature of a number of the national/global impact investments results in commitments that are placed over several years.



Impact investments are overseen by HCF's Impact Investment Advisory Committee, which is accountable to the Board of Directors.

As the Foundation continues to move toward its 2020 goal, it is working with Mercer, global investment consultants, to develop a structured asset mix that continues to provide granting and operational sustainability. In addition, HCF is working to develop impact metrics to assess the outcomes of these investments.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

Donations to the Foundation are invested in the public and alternative investment markets for the long term. Investment income is then allocated annually to support granting, community leadership and our ongoing operations. The summary and charts presented here are intended to provide both a financial snapshot and the recent history of activity that supports the remarkable donor, grants and community leadership stories included in this and all our annual reports, as well as the many unpublished stories of the work that HCF has the privilege of stewarding on behalf of our donors.

Outstanding support from HCF's donors continued in 2016-2017 with donations of \$3.2 million.

After a challenging investment market with slightly negative results in 2016, 2017 saw strong returns at +11.2% following the U.S. election. As long-term investors, HCF's investment and spending policies recognize that volatility is part of the reality of public market investing. The spending policy, which determines the amount available to grant in any given year, is currently set at four percent annually. This allows a consistent flow of granting, with excess income in higher-return years used to support income shortfall in weak years. Our reserves, which enable us to continue to grant and maintain operating capacity when the market is weak, remain at their policy maximum.


HCF continues its work to re-allocate more assets from our public market portfolio into investments that both align with our mission and provide the required investment returns. We are particularly pleased to report outstanding loans of over \$5.0 million through our local community investment fund. These loans support areas like affordable housing, affordable home ownership, protected land acquisition, and operational support for charities and not-for-profits.

DONATIONS

Donations to the Foundation are from individuals, corporations and other charities. Donors may contribute to named endowment or flowthrough funds or to the Board-directed Community Fund.

Total annual donations have ranged between \$3.2 and \$12.4 million over the past eight years. Annual donations are significantly influenced by the timing of the realization of gifts in wills. Donations




for 2017 were \$3.2 million, and were lower than 2016 when HCF received the \$5.0 million transfer of the Chedoke Health Foundation as well as a number of significant bequests. Our five-year rolling average donations range from \$4.9 million to \$8.2 million and has grown significantly in the last several years.

The number of donations received reached a historical high at 2,146 in 2015 and continues to be significantly higher since 2013 as a result of the number and nature of donor-sponsored events as well as the number of "in memoriam" donations.

GRANTS AND COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP

Grants are made annually both from endowment income and distribution of flowthrough funds. As a result, flowthrough funds materially influence the total annual amount granted.

Grants and community leadership project spending over the past eight years has ranged from \$4.0 million to a historic high of \$7.9 million last year.




Granting from endowment funds was reduced in 2013 as a result of the decline in investment returns in 2012 which a) lowered the asset base used for the granting calculation (currently 4.0 percent of the fund balances), and b) resulted in less income available to grant. Flowthrough granting and expenditures on community leadership projects has ranged from 28 percent to 56 percent of total granting in any given year.

INVESTMENTS

Investments traded in active markets are reported at their fair market value. Investments not actively traded are recorded at their cost less any impairment of their value.

To provide a more diverse and robust portfolio, HCF has committed to investing in alternative asset classes including real estate, infrastructure and private equity. These alternatives are consistent with the Foundation's long-term investment horizon and liquidity



requirements. Since these investments are not actively traded, they are valued at cost on the financial statements. In addition, the Hamilton Community Investment Fund (HCIF), which provides loans to local charities and not-for-profits, is reflected at cost in the investments. Current loans outstanding to charities and not-for-profits total \$5.1 million.

Our public market portfolios are invested according to investment policy guidelines established by HCF's Board of Directors. The portfolios are managed, in accordance with the policy, by three professional investment managers and are overseen by the Board's Finance and Investment Committee. As an endowment builder, HCF's policy focuses on long-term investing and this position is supported by developing and maintaining reserve accounts which are currently at their policy maximum. This committee reviews the investment managers' reports quarterly to assess each manager's performance. In addition, the committee formally evaluates the investment managers' performance semi-annually. The investment policy sets out a target asset mix as well as a range around these targets. The managers use their discretion to invest the portfolios within this range. The following reflects the current and target asset mix. For the alternative investments, "target" is the amount committed to this asset class; "current" is the amount actually invested at year end.



The unrealized gains (losses) reflect market volatility which affects the year end market value of our portfolio. The following graph compares:

- HCF's portfolios return for publicly traded securities for each year against the annual investment policy benchmark for that year
- · HCF's seven-year annualized return against the seven-year annualized investment policy benchmark
- Both return rates against the targeted investment policy long-term return range

Benchmarks reflect the performance of each market index based on HCF's specific target asset mix. Comparing actual results to the benchmark measures the value added by investment managers compared to the average market performance. HCF's investment policy is targeted at achieving a long-term investment return in the seven to eight percent range.




As illustrated, investment returns over the past eight years have been extremely volatile. After a nominally negative result at -0.1 percent in 2016, returns rebounded to 11.2 percent for 2017, which was lower than the 11.9 percent annual benchmark. The seven-year annualized return at 9.6 percent exceeds the target investment policy range and is 1.5 percent higher than the benchmark. As noted in the financial highlights, the current 10-year annualized return of 6.3 percent is at the lower end of the target range and reflects the challenging market conditions over the past decade.

Due to the long-term nature of the alternative investments, their returns are not included in this analysis. Results for these investments are continually monitored and are reported when realized.


OPERATIONS

Operating expenses for the fiscal year ended March 31, 2017 total \$2.3 million, an increase of 2.7 percent. Staffing costs related to the Foundation's 20 employees represent 71 percent of HCF operating costs.

In addition to breaking out cost by type, operating costs are allocated to each of the Foundation's operating areas: granting, community and philanthropic leadership, community relations and knowledge dissemination, asset development, and administration and governance. Examples of community and philanthropic leadership include convening around the city's critical issues as described on page 16 and 17 of this report. It also includes fostering the growth of philanthropy by sharing staff time and knowledge to support other charities.



The Foundation's annual development expenses are not necessarily attributable to the donations received in that year. The nature of donations to the Foundation can result in costs preceding the receipt of the donation by several years (for example, donations through wills). As a result, consistent with the community foundation sector, operating costs are evaluated by a ratio of total operating expenses to average total assets. Ratios fall within a range depending on the size and stage of the community foundation's development.




Management considers the ratio of 1.2 percent (1.2 percent in 2016) to be within an acceptable range compared with benchmarks established in the community foundation sector for a foundation of HCF's size and stage. We continue to monitor both the actual results and the benchmarks on an ongoing basis.

TOTAL ASSETS

Hamilton Community Foundation's total assets of \$193 million at March 31, 2017 include HCF funds balance and funds held on behalf of third parties at \$10.3 million.

HCF FUNDS BALANCE

Hamilton Community Foundation's funds balance represents accumulated donations plus the net investment earnings on these donations, minus granting and operating costs. Funds include both endowed and flowthrough funds. Endowed funds are held permanently and grant from investment earnings. Flowthrough funds are fully distributed as grants over a pre-determined term.



The funds balance has grown 66 percent to \$181 million at year-ended March 31, 2017 from \$109 million in 2010. Flat investment returns in 2016 muted the growth of funds, resulting in only one-percent growth despite close to \$12.0 million in new donations that year. The number of funds has grown 27 percent to 368 from 289 in 2010.

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A LEGACY OF SERVICE

Hamilton lost one of its most respected and bestloved supporters with the passing of Colin Lazier last summer.

Colin was known by his colleagues for his love of law, and for being a "lawyer's lawyer" who was always willing to help with a complex matter. The two other areas that engaged him just as passionately were his family and the community.

As an estate lawyer and adviser, Colin helped scores of people think about the kind of legacy they wanted to create and then turn their philanthropic goals into reality. Whatever their circumstances, he treated every client with the same level of respect and care.

A long-time advocate of Hamilton Community Foundation, Colin appreciated the Foundation's

Colin's wife Barbara says that "community meant such a lot to Colin." Those who had the privilege of working with him - as clients, law colleagues or community leaders — couldn't agree more. He will be sorely missed.
